Attendance Note:

A. Welcome and Introductions

Linda Goodman, OEC Acting Commissioner, opened the meeting. The January 20, 2017 were not yet adopted due to insufficient copies.

Liz Donahue from the Governor’s Office delivered a Governor’s proclamation thanking Linda Goodman for her leadership and service.

B. Access to Child Care in Connecticut

Mary Farnsworth, Director of Strategic Planning for the Office of Early Childhood delivered a presentation on some findings from the Unmet Need Report on demand and capacity for preschoolers and infants/toddlers and a preview of the larger analysis of access to come in the full report. A draft data brief was handed out. A series of webinars will be held after the report is released to discuss findings with stakeholders.

C. Project LAUNCH

Tizrah Kemp, Local Child Wellenss Coordinator and Heather Black, State Child Wellness Expert presented on the latest activities of focus of project LAUNCH. The project is focusing on the following processes and outcomes: Screening and Assessment (development screening in pediatric practices, ASQ, and maternal depression), Integration of Behavioral Health, Enhanced Home Visiting, Mental Health Consultation, and Family Strengthening. There is a two generation Young Child Wellness Workgroup with a particular focus on homelessness and substance abuse and a Public Awareness Campaign in development with input from families.

There was a question from the cabinet about the impact of cutting Help Me Grow funding on their screening efforts.

D. Building a Quality, Recognition and Improvement System

Jennifer Johnson, OEC Quality Improvement Division Director, provided an overview of the pilot planned for the Quality Recognition and Improvement System, THRIVE!. The Thrive! recognition rubric will be star-based with five categories scored separately and combined for an overall score. The categories rated will be Health and Safety, Learning and Environment, Workforce, and in the future Family Engagement, and Leadership. It is based on past work and feedback from the listening tour.

Thrive! will be piloted throughout the coming year with early adopters in 2018, voluntary statewide participation beginning in 2019, and required for state-funded programs in 2020. Family engagement will roll out in 2021 and Leadership in 2022. A set of forums statewide will be held this spring to share the Thrive! recognition rubric and pilot plans and receive feedback.

There were a few questions about the Thrive! Pilot.

- Why wait for the Leadership and Family Engagement stars? It was answered that this was due to feedback received at the listening tours and concern that infrastructure be in place for its roll out.
- Does this require that programs serve food through CACFP? No, it gives stars based on alignment with the nutrition and portion size guidelines of CACFP, but not fully participating in the program which has cumbersome paperwork.
- Why using Pyramid when switched to MyPlate? Pyramid is the social/emotional pyramid model, not the food nutrition model.

E. Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)

Ellen Cohn, Deputy Commissioner at the State Department of Education presented on the ESSA plan submitted. It includes many early childhood provision, many of which were incorporated from the February 2 forum's recommendations. To get feedback SDE conducted focus groups, 80+ stakeholder engagement groups and collected 6,500 survey responses and 1,000 pieces of feedback on the plan. The plan has passed its completeness check at the federal level and it awaiting full approval.

This plan offers a great opportunity to revise and retool strategies, but comew with no additional funds, so expectations should be managed. There will not be an opportunity to build new things, but instead refocus on practical solid strategies. One good change is that public schools will be able to assess based on growth in academic achievement vs scoring against grade level which will help the state support and recognize accelerating growth in student achievement and focusing on all children. Other priorities will include graduation rates and English language learning.

Best practices will be shared through appreciative inquiry. The lowest performing schools will be offered comprehensive support through cross divisional teams of the "best and the brightest" and tiered levels of support. Guidance will be evidence-based, assessments will require comprehensive stakeholder engagement, an electronic grant/improvement plan platform will be available, and evidence based professional development will be made available. Early childhood will be incorporated by invited OEC staff to be involved in writing guidance, participating in cross divisional teams, engaging the early childhood community throughout, and supporting early childhood transitions to school with best practices. Consolidated State Plan Components highlights were distributed which includes more detail.

F. Regulations and Background Checks

Cynthia Isales, OEC Chief Legal Counsel, provided an update regarding regulations and background checks. The cost of background checks will increase by \$50 as of July 1, 2017 due to a change in DESPP policy.

G. Announcements/Public Comment

Linda Goodman announced that David Wilkinson has been nominated as the new Commissioner of the Office of Early Childhood. His confirmation is pending. There were no public comments.
