First Words, First Steps: CT's Infant – Toddler Systems Framework

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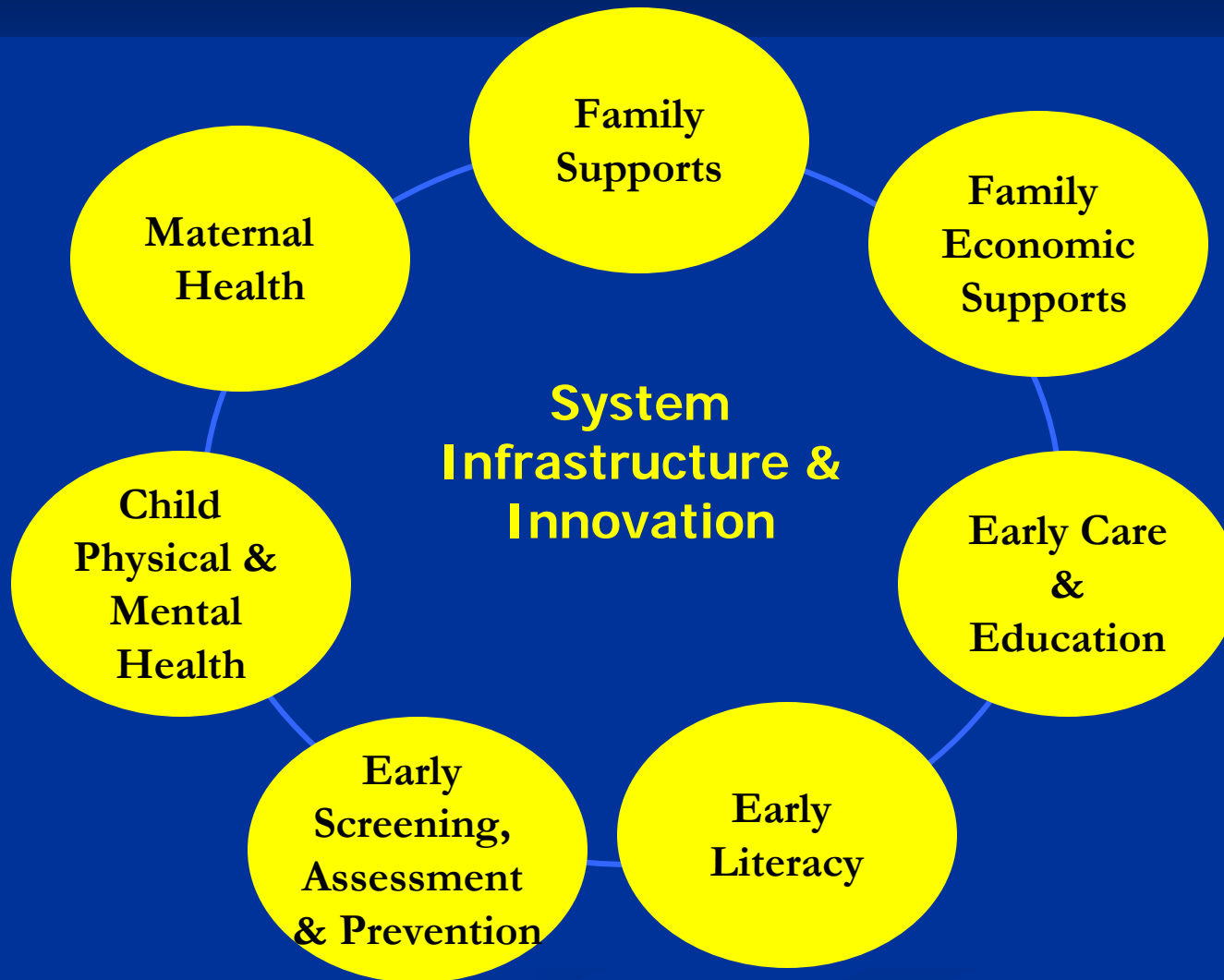
Development of the Infant-Toddler Systems Framework

- Development of the framework was one of the Cabinet's *Ready by Five, Fine by Nine* top ten priorities (July 2006)
- Anchored in “A Science-Based Framework for Early Childhood” published by the National Scientific Council on the Developing Child (2007)
- Constructed using Results-Based Accountability (RBA) principles with special attention to necessary data development
- Effort led Cabinet members, the Commission on Children and the CT Department of Social Services

Development of the Infant-Toddler Systems Framework

- Review and development by nearly 100 participants over an 18-month period
- Public input obtained from 450 citizens at 10 Local Listening Forums in the later fall of 2007
- 12 Essential Findings and core service/system concepts adopted at January 14, 2008 Cabinet meeting
- Review of Professor Jack Shonkoff, Harvard Center on the Development Child: “This is one of the best birth to three framework I’ve seen across the nation” (January 15, 2008)
- Released at the Governor’s Early Childhood Summit: Investing in the First Thousand Days

First Words, First Steps: Infant-Toddler Core Service and Systems Components



Systems Infrastructure and Innovation Components

- DSS, DPH, SDE, DCF, CTF develop MOA's for service delivery & model for "master contracts"
- Cabinet establishes a Collaborative Mgt Team & Project Manager to oversee I/T next steps
- Data system development
- Set aside 10% federal funds for B-3 services
- Within MH system of care, implement early childhood system
- Cabinet and SDE funded local planning to include literacy strategies
- Establish family support continuum
- Create regional/ community "hubs" as service model

Next Steps

- Cabinet to establish a process to prioritize the 30+ service recommendations (February and March, 2008)
- Examine priorities according to “no-cost and low-cost” options as well as options with a high predicted short-term ROI
- Develop data and research agenda items
- Refer top priorities to the Early Childhood Research and Policy Council for fiscal analyses and cost-modeling
- Council returns analyses to Cabinet for action by the early fall, 2008
