Introductions

Commissioner Jones-Taylor welcomed the group and outlined the order of the meeting.

Directory of Services

Grace Whitney shared a directory of services available in Connecticut that supports families who are experiencing homelessness.

United Way 2-1-1

The United Way of Connecticut gave a presentation about the new 2-1-1 search engine, which is anticipated to go live in August 2015. The new search engine is more robust and user-friendly. 2-1-1 houses information about 4,100 organizations and 48,000 services, most of which are based in Connecticut. The new search engine makes it easier to search simple, common-sense words, much like Google. Five full-time staff maintain 2-1-1 and keep it updated. An e-library houses 450 white papers that are developed by United Way of CT staff. A new feature allows an organization to post updates about the organization on-line, which is then reviewed and processed by United Way of CT staff. Another feature allows individuals to share information from the 2-1-1 website with another person by email or by text. The translator function is more powerful and improved.

2-1-1 serves as an entry hub for families experiencing homelessness or at risk of being homeless. 2-1-1 can make an appointment for such a family to undergo an assessment through one of the 8 Coordinated Access Networks (CANS). The assessment tool helps identify which families can be diverted from a shelter and which families need immediate shelter services.

Challenges and Needs

Commissioner Jones-Taylor led the group through an exercise to identify the challenges and needs of families with young children experiencing homelessness. The group identified the following:

Brenda Earle noted that there are no state funds for rapid rehousing and federal funding does not come close to addressing the need. She said HUD does not recognize doubling-up as a condition of homelessness, unlike the McKinney-Vento Act.

Top 5 Policy Changes

Commissioner Jones-Taylor asked the participants to identify the top 5 policy changes that their state agency could implement that would support families with young children experiencing homelessness. Participants representing nonprofit organizations were asked to pair up with individual representing state agencies.

A list of the policy changes captured on flip charts is attached to the minutes.

The OEC will develop and send out a survey to allow participants to review the policies identified, identify additional potential policy shifts and rank them in importance.

Commissioner Jones-Taylor said she would review the potential policy changes identified and reach out to fellow state agency commissioners to discuss. Discussion about potential policy changes will be brought to the full CT Early Childhood Cabinet meeting on July 30.

Other issues were raised at the meeting:

- Fathers and grandparents must be supported
- Make the connection between the Second Chance Initiative and the child
- Cross training with homeless shelter and domestic violence shelters is needed.
- How can the Governor's transportation agenda support this population?
- Judicial and Court Support Services Division should be at the table.


CT Early Childhood Cabinet Meeting
